One of my hopes in the planning of our Sunday services is that sermon subjects shall meet the questions most in the minds of us all.

So on each of the Sundays in September there will be near the Church door a Question Box at every service, in which you are welcome to "post" either a question to be answered, or perhaps a request for a sermon on a particular theme, or problem, or Bible passage. There might be a question about some part of Christian belief (about God, or about Jesus, or the Holy Spirit; or miragles, or the Bible itself, or the after-life). There could be a question about the Christian life, or about ordinary daily life, or modern world problems, though I would be foolish indeed if I pretended to know all the answers!

If a question or suggestion seemed likely to be of general interest to others too, then I would gladly try and answer it in a subsequent sermon. Questions posted at Children's Church would be answered at a later Children's Church; 11am questions would be answered at a forthcoming Morning Prayer; 6.30 pm questions would be taken on a later Sunday evening. If the questioner particularly needed to be anonymous, then so long as the question seemed right for general airing it could be answered none-the-less.

If the question, though important to the questioner, seemed not of sufficient general concern, or for some reason seemed not best dealt with in a sermon, then I would gladly answer it personally if it were signed in the ordinary way.

We shall have to call this September Special Offer! I hope I have not let myself in for more than I expected!

BEREAVEMENTS

We remember specially in our prayers members of our congregation who have been bereaved:-

Lady Parsons lost her husband, after many years in hospital during which he was not able to recognize her. SIR MAURICE PARSONS KGMG, a man greatly respected and influential in the world of finance, was Director of Operations for the International Monetary Fund from 1947 to 1949, and Deputy Governor of The Bank of England from 1966 to 1970. Lord O'Brien in a warm tribute in The Times described him as a supremely able and articulate ambassador of his country in the world of international monetary affairs, and added "He was a devout and influential Christian". Indeed, he and his wife used their home to help others find a personal faith in Christ, and we rejoice that he is now with the One he loved and served so well.

General Martin lost his wife Jean without warning from a sudden heart attack. She had been shopping in the Village Stores only a few hours before. She was the daughter of Sir Henry Cowan, a former M.P. for Guildford. Soon after her marriage in 1944 she followed her husband to India where he was involved in the Burma campaign, but it was not until the war was over that they were able to set up house together. During two further years in India they spent a memorable "end of war leave" of three months walking across the Himalayas into the mountains of Central Asia, using passes of 18,000 feet. She shared fully in the life of her husband in his various subsequent commands, in Trieste, and Fontainebleu as well as in this country. On his returement in 1956 they came to live in Hambledon. She shared actively too in his sporting life, skiing together in the winter, and sailing in the Baltic and elsewhere. She said recently that she had never been happier than in these retirement years in Hambledon. Miss Jean Hewlett lost her sister Dorothy after

a crippling heart attack. In the earlier years of her health and strength she was always busy. Her life's work was the care and teaching of the blind, and she learned braille to further this. She had a serious caraccident some 20 years ago, and suffered much discomfort as a result. We remember her as a regular worshipper and communicant on Sunday mornings, and behind this lay a real personal faith in Christ and love for God, with daily Bible Reading and prayer an important part of her life.

PERSONALIA

MR CROWHURST is safely back from hospital on a later stage of convalescence. MISS SYBIL HARCOURT-CLARKE has had a more prolonged stay than she had expected in Mount Alvernia Hospital where they have been trying to discover the cause of the pain which has made movement difficult for her of late. NEIL FISH has been in hospital for surgery on both feet, and it may be some time before he is fully mobile again.

Our best wishes go with several of our young people at the beginning of a new academic year. WENDY ARDEN-WHITE begins her teaching career at the Church of England Middle School at Colehill, near Wimborne. PAUL ATKINS returns for a fourth year at Bishop Otter College of Education, Chichester, and DAVE SMITH at Shoreditch College, Egham. Both have received their Diploma of Education, but now take this further year for the Bachelor of Education degree. CAROLINE ATKINS begins a course of secretarial training, and CAROLINE LUCAS a course at Capel Bible College. TIMOTHY ARDEN-WHITE sets off for Manchester University to read Geography, and CAROLINE BRANDON to either Durham or Hull University to read theology. TIMOTHY PARKER and JEREMY ERDY both begin at Cambridge University, Timothy to read English at Leterhouse, and Jeremy to read Mathematics at Trinity. With Andrew Maclay and Christopher Mabley already there, we should see plenty of that attractive shade of light blue around Hambledon at Boat Race time.

The "Tuesday morning group" has grown. It began with three members; but during recent months, with numbers in double figures and others thinking of joining, it seems likely to grow too big for the easy and open discussion which has been its most helpful feature. It has therefore been decided to offer two similar groups, on different morning, as follows:—

SUNDAY CLUB

Sunday Club reopens in The Rectory on 10 September. It caters for children aged about 5 to 11, from 11 am to 12 noon on the 2nd, 4th, and 5th Sundays of each month during term time. To enable parents to come to the 11 am service there is also a creche for tinies in The Rectory on the same Sundays. The senior group (for boys and girls aged 12 to 14) is also on the same Sundays at 11 am, beginning in the morning service in church, and later moving off to their special activity in Court Farm Cottage.

PARISH FELLOWSHIP

The Parish Fellowship season begins on 12 October, and from then on takes place each second Thursday of the month at 8 pm in the Village Hall. An open evening of an informal nature (often an illustrated talk of general interest, and sometimes an evening of games) is arranged by the church, but is meant for a wider audience, indeed for all who live in Hambledon and for their friends too.
