TWO MONTHS IN A KIBBUTZ Jenny Vranch reports on her recent visit

I have recently arrived home from a most enjoyable two months in Israel, where I was working as a volunteer on a kibbutz near the Red Sea.

A kibbutz is a working community in Israel where everyone works for the common good. Kibbutz life revolves round the dining room where everyone congregates, not only for meals, but also for social events such as the Wednesday night film, Most kibbutzim are self-contained. They have a school for children, a doctor's surgery, a hairdresser, a dentist, a food store, a clothes store, a laundry, and in our case a large dairy.

W orking day normally starts at 4.30 am and ends at 1 pm, with a break for breakfast. For the first month I was in the date groves. This involved climbing the date palms in order to secure the fruitbearing branches at right angles to the other branches. When all the branches were fastened, large net bags were tied over the fruits to protect them from birds and insects. insects. Both tasks took at least a month each. Most afternoons were spent recovering from work by the very large swimming pool. This was very necessary as it was extremely hard and tiring work.

I took four days off to visit Jerusalem, a city of many beliefs, of which Christianity plays a large part. Of all the places I saw, the Garden Tomb (the supposed place where Jesus was laid) and the Flace of the Skull (where Jesus is thought to have been crucified) were for me the most moving. For me the events of the Gospels have really been brought alive by my visit.

HELP FORGE A LINK

Could you have a student from West Africa as a guest in your home for a few days this Christmas or at some other time in the year? If you could, you would be helping to forge the special link our Guildford Diocese has with West Africa.

"For many overseas students life in Britain falls short of their expectations for two main reasons", says a Christian organisation which is looking for home which will offer hospitality to students. The first is Cultural Shock. It's not easy to study in a foreign country. Coping with strange food, a different culture, possibly an unfamiliar language can all be a considerable strain. Family and friends all seem very far away. Inflation makes life more and more expensive. Worries mount up and loneliness becomes very real. The second reason is Disillusionment. Most students arrive expecting a "Christian country" but all too often they leave without meeting Christians or seeing real Christianity. Instead, stunned by pornography and immorality, hurt by our British reserve, they may go home disillusioned and even antagonistic towards 'Christianity'.
