ANNUAL VESTRY AND PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING (Feb. 28th)

The following is a brief report of the proceedings. Messrs.

C.A. Chapman and S. Ayling were re-elected Churchwardens, and thanked for their past services. The following were elected as representatives of the Laity: Mr. H.M. Palmer (Diocesan Conference) Mrs. Ayling and Mrs. Carter (R.D. Conference); Messrs. Adgie.

Barker, Cronhelm, Head, Hutchins, Roderick, Williams, Mrs. Dowson, Mrs. Vacher, Miss Denny and Miss Parker.

The Church Accounts for the year ended December 31st, 1961 were presented by Mr. C.A. Chapman, Hon. Treasurer. He stated that the financial position was very satisfactory. The total income for the year was £2,498 (£1,843 in 1960). Free-Will Offerings and

Subscriptions had increased from £967 in 1960 to £1,422 in 1961 (the first complete year since the Stewardship Campaign). It was also encouraging to note that Collections in Church had also increased. Miss Denny, F.W.O., Secretary, was thanked for her much valued work.

The Treasurer stated that our contributions to Home and Overseas work had increased. £537 had been sent to Home Missions and Charities (£271 in 1960), and to Overseas Missions - £352 (£318 in 1960). Diocesan Quotas had been increased from £207 to £234 last year. A donation of £101 had been made by the Sewing Meeting to the Hambledon Almshouses.

The following are among the Societies supported in 1961:—Church Pastoral-Aid Society; Children's Society; Fegan's Homes; Moral Welfare; St. Luke's Clergy Hostel; London City Mission; C. of E. Pensions Board; Mission of Hope; S.P.C.K.; Richmond Fellowship; China Inland Mission; Commonwealth and Continental Church Society; Ruanda Mission C.M.S.; C.M.S. (General); Bible Society; Church Missions to Jews; Missions to Seamen; South American Missionary Society; Mission to Lepers; World Council of Churches Refugee Fund.

The Treasurer was thanked for his work and for the clear Statement of the Accounts, and the Hon. Auditor, Mr. Clayton, was also thanked for his services.

In his report the Rector thanked all Church Officers and helpers for their support, and stated that the attendances at church had been most encouraging. He made reference to the help given by the choir and organist, and noted with satisfaction that several boys had recently joined the choir and were making a valuable contribution to the worship. Mrs. Dowson was thanked for her kindness in allowing us to use her courtyard as a car park.

The Rector stated that Mr. Eric Parker had offered to donate land for an extension to the Churchyard, and the Parochial Church Council had gratefully accepted this generous gift, which also included the building of an extension to the boundary wall. Further details would be announced when preliminaries had been completed.

We thank God for her example of simple faith in Him, and assure her family of our sympathies in their bereavement.

Another well known resident in Hambledon, Mr. Walter Denyer of Speedwell Cottage, died in hospital after an illness following a fall in his home. We wish to express to his widow our sympathies in her sorrow.
