In his remarks Sir John reminded us of the special interest he has in this Parish, being the Chairman of the Martyrs' Memorial and Church of England Trust—the Patrons of the Living. The financial result of the Fête was a record—over £157 was received on the day. It is not possible for me to mention by name everyone who helped in this effort, but to everyone who helped us in any way we extend our very sincere thanks. A few details about the amounts collected at the various stalls, etc., will be included in this magazine.

The visit of the Rev. Fred Barff for our Missionary Sunday (July 13th) was much appreciated. Stormy weather adversely affected our congregations, and we were sorry that there were not more with us to hear Mr. Barff, who brought to us some up-to-date and first-hand news of the work of the Church Missionary Society in Ruanda. About nineteen collecting boxes for the Ruanda Mission of the C.M.S. were taken as a result of the visit, and the collections amounted to £15. We feel that we now have a vital contact here in Hambledon with this particular part of the Church's work overseas.
