LOCAL MORAL WELFARE WORKERS' REPORT.

In writing a Report on moral welfare work carried out for the Haslemere and Hindhead Moral Welfare Association (now known as the Farnham and Godalming Deaneries M.W.A.) the worker, Miss Chatterton, mentioned the privilege of helping approximately 700 individuals who sought her advice, comfort or help over the years.

People are referred by clergy, doctors and Citizens' Advice Bureaux, solicitors, schools, health visitors and others - with the consent and knowledge of the client concerned.

The main trend of the work follows the pattern of family welfare; parents undergoing marriage strain because of housing difficulties, unwise budgeting and debts, ill health, failure to maintain a wife and children, infidelity. Also young people by preventive work, and irresponsible married or unmarried parents.

After-care is kept up wherever wanted or possible, sharing a family's progress through the years as and when needed.

It is the moral welfare workers' duty, not only to interpret social services and legislation by giving practical help, but at the same time to uphold the Christian standard in all social and moral problems within a changing pattern of society.
