We warmly welcome to Hambledon the first of two refugee Families to occupy the new houses in Wormley Lane (Knowle Cottages) which have been built by the County of Surrey's Refugee Committee. Mr. and Mrs. Pachnvik and their nine children are delighted to have a home of their own at last. For many years they have suffered hardship, and we hope that they will soon be very happily settled in Knowle Cottages and in Hambledon. It was most unfortunate that one of the children contracted infectious jaundice shortly after they arrived here, and that this prevented the family from joining in the official opening ceremony arranged by Sir John Wenham.

Refugee Family in Austria.

The Getto family were visited by Mrs. Julian Haviland in April. She reported great distress. Herr Getto after years of stomach trouble is now in hospital with T.B. His mother who lived with them and worked continually on the new house has died after a stroke. This means Frau Getto can no longer go out to work as she cannot leave the children of 4,6 and 7, and the only money coming in is a little sickness benefit.

Most of the plastering of the house is done but there is no drainage, no doors, no windows. If some of these can be done they hope to move into two rooms this winter. Student labour will be available again this summer but some paid work will be necessary. The family are now eligible for an Austrian Government loan but it is almost certain they cannot afford to avail themselves of it. A great letter has been received in answer to messages of sympathy.

A parcel of good second hand clothing has been sent supplemented with new pullovers and shoes, the money for the latter having been given anonymously. In view of this distress it was decided that the remaining £45 from the effort of March 1960 should be divided and £25 has now been sent to the Gettos from the authorities, and the last £20 has been sent to the Surrey Refugee Committee for presents to be bought for the two families now arriving at the new houses in Hambledon.

The Cettos have no furniture or bedding to move to their new house and money towards this or materials to make up would be very acceptable.
