A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

We wish all who will be taking their Annual holidays during the coming weeks a very happy and health-giving time. It is important that when we are away from home we should not neglect our religious practice. Those who are spending a holiday in the British Isles will have no difficulty in finding a suitable place of worship, and those who travel abroad may find that they are staying in a place where English Services are provided. In many of the popular tourist centres on the Continent there are English Churches, and details of Services can be obtained at hotels and the local tourist offices. The A.A. Foreign Tourist Guide gives some details, and the lists provided by the Bishops of Fulham and Gibraltar, who are responsible for the Anglican Church in Europe, will be found in the Church porch. We hope this information may assist you when making your plans for a holiday abroad.

The Profumo scandal has been given wide publicity and the comments of Christian leaders have made it clear that the nation is "confronted with a moral crisis rather than a political one". The Bishop of Carlisle has said, "Base corruption and deceit at the heart of the nation's life must be repudiated by action as well as by explanation. The conscience of the nation must be stirred to realise that this is but a symptom of the general moral deterioration in this country which we all share." The Bishop of Blackburn has said that the Profumo affair is "A challenge to all of us to review our own moral standards". Many of us are aware of how sadly true are the words of the Rt. Rev. T. M. Hughes:- "We live in an atmosphere which accepts moral laxity as normal, extolling it as a symbol of personal freedom. The declining standards lie in the apathy prevalent these days towards God and the things of God."
