A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR.

After attending Holy Communion on four consecutive Sundays a young Communicant approached the Vicar of a Midland parish and asked him if he would write a letter to his parish priest at home to inform him that he had received Communion on each of the Sundays of his holiday. This request shows how much the need for faithful and regular attendance at the Lord's Table had been impressed upon this young person.

The way in which many young people, and also older folk, become slack in their Church attendance shortly after their Confirmation is one of the disappointments clergy face in their ministry. During the period of preparation for Confirmation one is encouraged by the regular attendance of candidates at the classes and the Sunday Services. The habit so often continues for a few months and then attendance becomes spasmodic. Those responsible for the conduct of the services, and other Church members may be much to blame for this sad state of affairs, but one of the main reasons for the way in which many young folk drift away after their Confirmation is that they receive so little encouragement at home. Their parents, though full members of the Church, seldom attend public worship themselves and, after having seen to it that their children are duly Baptised and Confirmed, do nothing further to help them in their Christian life. There are, however, many young folk who become an example to their parents and teachers, and who will allow nothing, except sickness, to keep them away from Church. It would be good to see more families attending public worship and kneeling together at the Lord's Table.

May I commend to you the following short guide to the duties of Church membership which was issued by the Archbishops a few years ago:-

"All baptised and confirmed members of the Church must play their full part in its life and witness. That you may fulfil this duty we call upon you:-

- 1) To follow the example of Christ in home and daily life and to bear personal witness to Him.
- 2) To read the Bible carefully
- To be regular in private prayer day by day.
- 4) To receive the Holy Communion faithfully and regularly.
- 5) To come to Church every Sunday.

- To give personal service to Church, neighbours and community.
- 7) To give money for the work of the parish, diocese and for the work of the Church, both at home and overseas.
- To uphold the standard of marriage entrusted by Christ to His Church.
- 9) To care that children are brought up to love and serve the Lord".

SUNDAY SCHOOL

We wish to record our sincere thanks to Mrs. Peer who for some time has been responsible for keeping our Sunday School together. This has been no easy task and, in common with so many parishes, we have found that the interest in the Sunday School has for several years been gradually decreasing. It has been decided that instead of holding a class in the School on the 2nd., 4th., and 5th. Sundays in the month, we should experiment with a new type of gathering for both parents and children in Church. We therefore commend to the present Sunday School schoolars and all who are interested the new "For Parents and Children". This will be held on the second and fourth Sundays in the month, commencing on the Second Sunday in OCTOBER (13th) CHILDREN's CHURCH (the Family Service) will, of course, continue to be held on the first and third Sundays, and at certain Festivals, and "Parents and Children" will only replace "Sunday School".

'FOR PARENTS AND CHILDREN'

Several parents have asked 'Could we not have Children's Church every Sunday, instead of just on the first and third of the month'. Starting in October we shall be holding a new gathering on the second and fourth Sundays (and, when appropriate, on the

fifth) which we are simply calling 'For Parents and Children'. The time and place will be the same, and the service quite similar to our present Children's Church, although perhaps different enough to give variety.

'For Parents and Children' will be run by Bill Smyly and Derek Davis, both of whom have considerable experience in this type of work, and the first of the 'new' services will be on October 13th at 10 a.m. Please note the date and come along to give us all an encouraging start.
